V-J Day Ceremony

The annual salute for Victory over Japan Day, which took place in Tokyo Harbor on Sept. 2, 1945, will be held Sept. 2 at Fort Miles. This ceremony salutes the 800 Delaware soldiers who perished during World War II, with 100 names read each year. Plan to join us for this special time of commemoration.

VJ DAY AT Fort Miles

The Fort Miles Historical Association's sixth annual VJ day event celebrates the surrender of the Japanese Empire to the Allied Forces signaling the end of WWII. It also honors the 774 Delawareans who perished while serving their country during the war.

The 11:00 AM ceremony will include an oral history of the war leading up to the surrender, a reading of General Douglas MacArthur's speech, and a tolling of the bell for 100 of the 774 brave Delawareans who made the ultimate sacrifice during WWII.

Visitors can explore the historic area, tour the Fort Miles Museum and Battery 519, view future museum plans, and learn about organizations that support Fort Miles.



Brig Gen. Kennard Wiggins (DE ANG Ret.) is Curator for the Delaware Military Museum. He is the author of six books on local military history. His most recent book is America's Anchor, A Naval History of the Delaware River and Bay

December 7, 1941, saw America's abrupt entry into World War II. What many do not know is that Delaware and the nation had already been preparing for war for over a year. Retired Brig. Gen. Kennard R. Wiggins Jr., Delaware ANG, will present a lecture Sept. 10 in conjunction with the unique (and free) Oil Still Bleeds exhibit. General Wiggins' subject is "Delawareans at Pearl Harbor and During the Very Early Days of World War II." He offers his insights into the circumstances for Delaware's military personnel Dec. 7, 1941, and the days that followed. General Wiggins will present his free talk at 1 p.m. at the Lewes History Museum, 101 Adams Ave.
