

Historical Lecture Series: The Lost World War II Submarine USS Albacore (SS-218)



Fort Miles Museum is pleased to present its third event in the Historical Lecture Series of 2024.

On Saturday, April 13, 2024, historian and author David L. Johnston will discuss the discovery and survey of the wreck site of the lost World War II submarine USS Albacore (SS-218). Albacore's wreck was found by a Japanese researcher in 2022. Johnston and fellow researcher Steve Katona conducted an extensive analysis of the wreckage and wrote a report for the Navy that was the key factor confirming the wreck's identity.

The lecture will cover the discovery, the work that confirmed the wreck's location and the process used to analyze the video and photographs of the wreck. The presentation will cover Delmarva residents lost on WWII submarines, including one from the Albacore crew.

Due to high demand, all spaces for this event have been filled. The final lecture, Cold War Activities at Fort Miles, will be presented on Saturday, May 18, 2024.


FMHA Tours Defenses of WWII at Cape May

The Milford Museum will continue its American History Series with *A Brief Introduction to the du Pont Family and the DuPont Company, Part II* at 1 p.m. on Saturday, April 20th at Milford Public Library.

presentation focused on why the du Pont family immigrated to the United States and how it built a worldwide explosives business. The second part will take the family and company into the 20th century.
