



Fort Miles Museum Dispatch

December 1, 2025

The Dispatch is a periodic newsletter shared with almost 2000 individuals who have participated in Fort Miles programming or have asked to be informed of what is happening at the Fort Miles Museum and Historic Area at Cape Henlopen State Park.

It chronicles news from the partner organizations that support Fort Miles: Delaware State Parks, the Fort Miles Historical Association (FMHA) and the Fort Miles Museum Board. Additionally, FMHA members receive Bunker Blasts that focus on FMHA activities and the history of Fort Miles.

Delaware State Parks (DSP) operates and staffs the Fort Miles Museum and other historical WWII structures in Cape Henlopen State Park.

The Fort Miles Historical Association (FMHA) is the 260+ member Friends group founded in 2003 and partnered with Delaware State Parks to spearhead and begin the restoration of the many structures that make up Ft. Miles, the largest WWII coastal defense installation in the country. The volunteer "Bunker Busters" do the restoration and maintenance of all the WWII structures, and acquire, restore and display historical artifacts in the Museum. FMHA also holds special events, operates the Museum gift shop, and assists DSP with opening and operating the Museum.

The Fort Miles Museum and Historical Area (FMM) was formed in 2021 to bring DSP and FMHA together with community members on a Board whose primary functions are fundraising for capital

projects such as the Museum expansion and publicizing and encouraging visitation through communications and advertising.

An Old Gun Finds a New Home

After more than 75 years a 155mm GPF artillery piece has found its way to Fort Miles!



For decades the Fort Miles Museum and Historical Area and the Fort Miles Historical Association have worked together to build an artillery park representing the many types of artillery present at Fort Miles in WWII. Two of the earliest pieces procured as part of that project were a pair of Vietnam War-era 155mm Howitzers. Although the guns were more modern and served a different function, their size was the same as the 155mm GPF artillery which came to Fort Miles and was once located at the current McBride Beach Bathhouse. Though the howitzers have served as excellent placeholders for the original guns the hope for many years has been to acquire a GPF.

Easier said than done! 155mm GPF guns were designed in France for WWI, eventually being built and used by the United States. But as the decades have worn on, these guns have become increasingly rare throughout the United States and finding an available one seemed nearly impossible.

Last year, through the hard work and dedication of members of the Fort Miles Historical Association a gun was found at an American Legion post in Ohio. Although it was in poor shape there was some hope that it could be repaired and refurbished.



In the end it took a massive partnership to bring this gun to Fort Miles. Delaware State Parks worked with the United States Tank Automotive and Armaments Command and the Fort Miles Historical Association to identify an available gun and determine which of the howitzers could be traded for it. Members of the Fort Miles Historical Association worked tirelessly to prepare one of the original howitzers for its move to Ohio.

The Mahan Collection Foundation, Inc. generously offered their services not only to pick the gun up from Ohio, but to take it back to their facilities to repair, rebuild, and refurbish the entire piece, bring it to its new home in the Fort Miles Museum and Historical Area's Artillery Park and take one of the howitzers back up to Ohio to fulfill the trade agreement. Finally, Coastal Towing and Heavy Hauling offered their services to carefully remove one of the howitzers and place the much heavier and less maneuverable GPF in its new location.



Through the hard work and generosity of many, the 155mm GPF was put into position on November 13th, 2025, marking the first time a new piece of artillery has come to the park in nearly a decade. The Fort Miles Museum is grateful to everyone who made this trade possible!

If you're in the area, don't miss your chance to stop by to see this old gun in a new home, the first 155mm GPF here at Fort Miles since the 1940's.

Fall and Winter Lecture Series Continues

On November 15th over 100 people attended the lecture by Navy Capt. (Ret.) Bill Manthorpe on the U.S. Navy Sound Surveillance System which was a top-secret program of underwater listening devices 100 miles out in the ocean to listen for and locate Soviet submarines. One of the principal locations for this system was at Ft. Miles, and was managed in a building, long since taken down, in front of Battery Herring at Herring Point in CHSP.

Our next Lecture is:

January 17, 2026, The Berlin Airlift: First Victory of the Cold War by FMHA Historian Ed Paterline

The talk will cover the history of the Airlift and the impact of the Airlift on subsequent US actions in the Cold War era. Dover Air Force Base is the home of the Air Mobility Command Museum and houses a C-54 used during the Airlift. Ed's father flew the Berlin Airlift and Ed and his father attended the 50th Anniversary celebrations in Berlin and met many of the participants.

An invitation to this lecture will be going out in mid-December. Remember, FMHA Members get "first crack" to register for our lectures before the general public, so if you want to attend, please consider joining FMHA here.
